Cadets ready to go to next level

In recent months, 40 Narrabri and Wee Waa High School Year 10 (and some Year 9 at Wee Waa) students have been taking part in the annual NSW SES youth engagement program.

One day a week, they have learned what the SES is all about - largely through learning at school and visits to other emergency services.

The purpose of the cadet program is to provide a pathway into their local SES unit should they wish to join.

And the students got the chance to put what they have learned to the test last Wednesday at Cameron Park, where the cadets took part in an activity day.

SES Namoi region learning and development officer Graeme Geyer

said cadets practised search-and-rescue, throwing rescue bags, forensic land search, 'jack and pack' rescues, stretcher carrying and rope skills.

"It gives them an idea of some of the skills they need if they want to join their SES unit," he said.

As well as learning SES skills they were also taught about flood safe behaviour, such as not going into flood water, and storm preparation.
